Topic: Supporting the University Dining Services' Exclusive Use of Cage-Free Eggs

WHEREAS, University Dining Services (UDS) is considering the replacement of battery-cage eggs (produced by hens confined in cages) with cage-free eggs in University dining facilities;

WHEREAS, the American egg industry is increasingly being controlled by large agribusiness corporationsⁱ that tend to drive smaller farms out of business;

WHEREAS, factory egg farming has a documented detrimental effect on the environment^{ii,iii};

WHEREAS, many legislative bodies (such as European Union^{iv}) have already begun phasing out the use of battery cages in egg production, and several American dining establishments (such as McDonald's^v, Burger King and Wendy's^{vi}) have established their own guidelines for the better care of caged chickens;

BE IT RESOLVED that GAPSA supports the exclusive use of certified cage-free eggs by University Dining Services;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that GAPSA encourages UDS to increase cooperation with small, local, cage-free farmers in an effort to provide graduate students with food choices on campus while simultaneously supporting local farms.
